

## **What is the AHAR?**

The Annual Homeless Assessment Report (AHAR) is a report to Congress about the number and characteristics of people who use homeless residential services and their patterns of use. Congress mandated this report in legislation for HUD McKinney-Vento funding. Currently, the report includes data on emergency shelters and transitional housing programs. AHAR 5 will also include a special report on homeless veterans. The report's two main sources of data are HMIS and the January point-in-time counts from each Continuum of Care's Exhibit 1 HUD application.

## **How does the data get collected?**

Wilder staff run reports in ServicePoint to collect the data. All of the data is automatically aggregated – no client level information is passed on to HUD. The summarized data is then uploaded to a HUD website for the analysis team to see.

## **When is the data collected?**

The reporting period for the AHAR is October 1 – September 30. HMIS staff will begin collecting the data on November 1. The standard AHAR deadlines are, draft AHAR due mid-December, final AHAR data due late January, draft veteran's AHAR due early March, and final veteran's AHAR data due early April.

## **Who participates in the AHAR in Minnesota?**

Six sites in Minnesota were selected prior to the first AHAR as sample sites, and these sites' data is weighted more heavily in the report. These "sample sites," which are CDBG jurisdictions, are the City of Rochester, the City of Moorhead, the City of St. Paul, Northwest Hennepin County, Washington County, and Norman County. There are 102 sample sites nation-wide. While only these sample sites are required to participate, for the second year, Minnesota will be submitting data for each CoC in the state.

## **Is participation required?**

Participation in the AHAR is voluntary. However, AHAR participation status was a question on the past HUD CoC Funding Applications and is expected to be included again in the future.

## **What data elements are reported?**

The data elements included in the report are limited to HUD's universal data elements, which include demographic information, veteran and disability status, previous housing situation and zip code, and length of stay.
